A note from our pastor...

Beautiful Beloveds,

Happy New Year! 'Tis the season for resolutions. As you look ahead to 2024, how do you intend to live and love differently? We often commit to healthy habits for our bodies. Don't forget healthy habits for hearts and souls. What spiritual practices might you try as we begin another new year? As I look ahead to the General Conference of United Methodist Church and another presidential election, I wonder, might we prepare by deepening our curiosity and compassion, softening our hearts, supercharging our listening, and widening our welcome?

In January, I'm excited about our next worship series, "In a New Light." We'll hear familiar stories of Jesus beginning his ministry. We'll celebrate his baptism, and watch as he invites working fishermen to try something new. Alongside these familiar and favorite stories, we'll also examine the "clobber passages." These are scriptural texts that have been used to harm and condemn lgbtq+ children of God. We'll try to see if together, we can read these texts in a new way, a more helpful, loving, and life-giving way.

In the season of Epiphany we give thanks for the many ways God is revealed in the person, and ministry of Jesus. I pray our study of familiar and troubling texts will also reveal something about God, ourselves, and our church. How do we hold our favorite scriptures alongside those that trouble us and hear the voice of God, clearly and consistently? What do we believe about scripture? What do we believe about Jesus? What do we believe about human sexuality?

During the week, we'll dig a little deeper. On Wednesdays at 11 am, I'll again be a Phantom Farm to take your questions, comments and ponderings. Wednesday evenings, we'll gather on Zoom at 7pm, and Adama Brown will lead us on a deeper dive in the texts too often used to justify harm and exclusion of lgbt folk. And if none of these times work you, please know you can set up time to walk and talk, or sit together to explore whatever's on your heart and mind. Together, let's challenge our assumptions, and invite the spirit to lead us as we learn together.

As we move into a new year together, may 2024 be filled with love and light. May we see in ways we have never seen before God's love active and changing our world. May there be peace, deep peace, in every heart, home, church, community and nation.

CLIMATE CARE - SOLAR PHOTOVOLTAICS / HEAT PUMP COMMITTEE

Once again - thank you to everyone who responded to our online survey or provided input at listening sessions during coffee hour. The committee met in December and voted to recommend that the church proceed with energy conservation measures (lighting and insulation) as well as the installation of solar photovoltaic panels on Cargill Hall. Both of these measures were largely supported by the congregation, have a reasonable payback and will decrease the church's annual operating expenses. Heat pumps for the Sanctuary and Cargill Hall also had support from the congregation. Given the capital and increased operating expenses needed for any heat pump installations, the committee decided to focus on the other two measures for now and consider heat pumps at a later date. The committee will now be working to obtain quotes on the solar photovoltaic system and then gaining approval from the Trustees and the Church Council. Simply put, a Reconciling Church has an affirming logo on their church sign and website ensuring that EVERY human who would like to walk through its doors is welcomed with open arms. One could argue that we already are a welcoming church and while I do not disagree with this, one must enter our church to find this out. Twenty years ago, my wife Kerri and I were "church shopping," as we were planning on starting a family and wanted to find a safe place to worship and

develop a deeper relationship with God. We walked into quite a few churches before finding AMUMC. The anticipation of introducing ourselves upon entering each church as a couple was enough to make us turn the car around. We did not know how people would react, IF they would want us to worship with them and baptize our children in their congregation. The experience was so daunting that we almost gave up on our goal. I am so grateful that we did enter Arnold Mills UMC as we were immediately welcomed by Reverend Roger and a parishioner Mary Beth McIntire. It was a moment that we will never forget and one that concluded our search. Reverend Roger was the first person to hold each of our children when they were born, and we still exchange Christmas cards with Mary Beth! Over the years, our family of four has become active members at AMUMC and have consistently felt the love around us! It is true, we ARE a welcoming church but.....what if we didn't enter 20 years back? What if our search ended after not feeling welcomed at another church? - The portfolio value has increased this year, despite necessary withdrawals.
- Major repairs to the church and parsonage heating and electrical systems will be funded from the portfolio in the future.
- The RISE audit and the congregational energy use survey were reviewed by Dave Larson. The Sustainability Project is continuing to make progress.
- The church pews and wood floors will be given a fresh coat of paint by a kind, industrious member. Thank you, Ross Hancock!
- The Safety and Security Plans were presented by Pastor Heather and Tom Cabana. Plans were reviewed, approved, and will be sent on to the Church Council for approval.
- The Cub Scout Pinewood Derby will be held in Cargill Hall on January 19th and 20th.
- Thanks to Tom Cabana, Scott Murphy, and George Gettinger, the new Handicapped Parking signs have been installed.
- Artwork which was donated by kind neighbors to the Holiday Fair Treasures Room is now hanging in "Pamela's Niche", a new consignment shop on North Washington Street in North Attleboro. Please stop by this fine shop[!

Finance Committee Update

Thank you for your generosity during 2023. We met our budgeted goal for donations during the year! We also had an amazing 2023 Holiday Fair this year, with revenue of \$9,152, and a record year for Happy Basket donations of \$1,010. We also continued to make a difference with donations to Mission Shares, UMCOR and other Special Sunday funds that connect us with the church worldwide.

Church operating expenses continue to outpace donation income. Costs for heat, electricity, building maintenance and property insurance continue to rise. This is an ongoing challenge. We are fortunate to have a church portfolio which is available to help us supplement our cash flow when needed.

Tips for January 2024

John Wesley began a New Year tradition of leading people in <u>renewing their covenant</u> with God. At the very beginning, God gave us a garden to tend and till. Now is the time to renew your commitment to be good stewards of our earth. **Choose one new thing you can do** throughout the year to care for creation.

Junk mail invades our lives to the tune of 41 pounds per person per year. Eighty to 100 million trees lose their lives each year to print junk mail, and much of it ends up in landfills. **Stop junk mail.** Here are three ways.

In a world that needs kindness and delight, <u>Positively Green Cards</u> delivers both, responsibly. These greeting cards are made from recycled material, printed with soy ink, and manufactured using green power. The company also donates 10% of their profits to organizations that care for the environment. **Make someone—and earth—happy!**

Corporate and governmental practices that despoil the land or water affect people of color to a far greater degree than richer and whiter communities. Martin Luther King, Jr. stood against racism, including environmental racism. **Honor King's legacy by working for justice**, especially on behalf of people of color and indigenous tribes.

We're charging into a new political year, yet the <u>1774 voting advice of John Wesley</u> is still relevant. The stakes are high for creation and for justice. Listen closely to the candidates' pitches and find out more about their record of action. **Support those who work for good for all.** Encourage friends and family to engage also. Then vote.

Could you be a "reducetarian"? You may know the high costs meat, eggs, and dairy inflict on the planet, the animals, and water, but going vegetarian or vegan is not for you or your family. There is, as John Wesley would say, a "Third Way." **Reducing the amount of animal products in your diet** by just 10% makes a difference, and if just 25% of Americans did so, the impact would be enormously helpful. Find out more here.

Hot food or drink in single-use cups and take-out containers made of what is often called "Styrofoam" leach toxins (Styrene and Benzene—both suspected carcinogens and known neurotoxins). Some ultimately will be absorbed into our bloodstream and tissues. Keep that in mind. **Demand and use alternatives** (glass, ceramic, aluminum, even multiple-use plastic ware). Speak up for your health and the health of the environment.

Go thrifty; save the earth! When you **purchase clothing from a thrift or second-hand store**, your choice uses fewer resources, generates fewer emissions and less waste, gives other people work, extends the life of the garment, and keeps textiles out of the landfill.

Cook pasta in its sauce and about ½ cup of water or broth. This small change is projected to save some six billion gallons of water a year that would otherwise be thrown out. Your community may be spared, but our neighbors across the country and around the world are dealing with drought. Conserving water is a baseline action of caring for all.

You already know Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. You may even have added Refuse, Repair, and Rot (compost) to the list. Here's one more: Remember! First, **remember who you are and Whose you are!** When you focus on God's call to you to care for creation and justice, it's easier to remember to do the other R's.


To register go to the Children & Youth page under Education on the church website (amumc.org). You will find a form you can print and fill in and an online form if you prefer registering online. Use either one to register.
