April Trustee Report

The Trustee Committee met on April 13th at 6:30 P.M. in the library. The treasurer and secretary were absent, but their reports were submitted and approved. The financial report showed the portfolio had over a \$30,000 gain in March. That is the direction we like to see!

The following issues made for quite a long meeting....

- The value of the Sustainability Project fund has grown to \$16,986.31 due to another large donation. We are researching ways for the church to improve our carbon footprint such as installing solar panels and heat pumps. All members were looking forward to the "Carbon Footprint Fair" being organized by Dave Larson.
- The floor in Cargill Hall was stripped and waxed by Marques Cleaning Service in time to shine for Easter!
- Adding portholes or windows to all solid doors in the church is still being looked into.
- We are having contractors look at painting the street sign, a broken step at the parsonage, the climbing platform on the swing set, and upgrading the downstairs bathrooms.
- Malloy Oil will be asked to service the air conditioners, dehumidifier, and to drain the boiler for the summer.
- Two exterior lights for the parsonage were purchased in February and recently installed by Eastland Electric.
- Thanks to Karen Oswain, the garden under the flagpole has been raked, but we really need to rake the whole lawn. The scouts have done a spring cleanup for years so will be contacted to see if they have plans to do this and if so, when.
- Lou's Stonework will be contacted to fix the crumbling stone walls out front.
- The dumpster was emptied in April. We are doing this as an "as needed" event in order to save money.
- The "Little Library" has been repaired.
- Our neighbor across the street, Sean Flaherty, has left a truck on church property. Since we do own the land next to the fire station, it was decided that our chairperson should make a neighborly visit to discuss moving the truck.
- -The AED demonstration was well attended and follow up sessions on First Aid and CPR may follow.
- The issue of safety in church was brought up. Pastor Heather will contact the Cumberland Police Department for recommendations.
- Two requests to rent Cargill Hall for family affairs were approved. One will be in July and one in September.
- Finally, we were notified that three back up fender bender accidents have occurred in April in the parking lot adjacent to Cargill Hall. It was decided that we would look into seal coating and then redoing the spaces. Eliminating parking spots in the middle may be helpful.
- As you can see, many projects to keep our buildings and property in good shape are being juggled. We would love to add one or two more trustees so if you are interested, please let us know!

Cintas Clothing Donation and the St. James Episcopal Church Clothing Closet

The twice monthly clothing donations continue from the Cintas Warehouse in Woonsocket to the St. James Church clothing closet. In addition, our church members responded to the call for NEW socks and underwear for the St. James Clothing Closet as their funding for those items had been discontinued.

The Franklin Farm Community Garden and the Historic Metcalf-Franklin Farm Preservation Association

During the 16th season of raising farm fresh vegetables for needy families in Rhode Island, the volunteers grew and distributed over **35,000 pounds** of various vegetables to the **RI Community Food Bank** and to local soup kitchens and food pantries in Northern RI. **On Saturday, April 22**nd, the volunteers held a clean-up day remove the winter debris around the 1857 Farmhouse and the Barn complex and to harrow in the compost and the winter rye cover crop. **On May 19**th and **20**th the seeds and seedlings will be planted. **We will then begin the Monday and Thursday volunteer tending nights from 5:30 PM to dusk beginning on Monday May 22nd.** In addition, the farm fields continue to be open for casual outdoor enjoyment for families and their pets. Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity Northern RI and West Bay Affiliate is celebrating their 30-year anniversary this year! The current project is to erect **two** duplexes at **83 & 85 Oakland School Street in Burrillville**, **RI.** The first duplex is almost complete and the final projects do not require our volunteer assistance. The second duplex foundation will be installed in the next several weeks and then the volunteer groups can be assigned the various construction tasks. **We will notify AMUMC volunteers when we can return to the work site as we have done previously.**

Dave's Marketplace Day Old Bakery Donations

Since 2016, volunteers from AMUMC have transported day old baked goods three times each week to the Cumberland Senior Center, the Northern RI Food Pantry or the Woonsocket Shelter. The schedule of the three donations each week and the many volunteers making the deliveries is posted on the bulletin board in the coat room.

The Woonsocket Shelter

The Woonsocket Shelter has received donations of persons care items and household items (sheets, towels, quilts, curtains, etc.) for families to relocate into independent living when they leave the shelter. In addition, AMUMC volunteers have been donating day old baked goods from area supermarkets – currently Dave's Marketplace – for over 15 years to the shelter. On Fridays, Elton and Rachel Odom make the weekly deliveries to the Shelter.

An effective way to change a habit is to anchor it with another action you are committed to and do regularly.

Try these prompts for a better, cleaner spring:

When you are spring cleaning and realize you no longer need something, resist the temptation just to toss! Instead, take the time to find a place to donate. Your efforts avoid adding to landfills and to air and land pollution and to the injustice suffered by people close to the landfill.

When you eat food on <u>Mondays</u>, <u>make your meals meatless</u>. Actually, any day of the week will work to forego the expense to you and the planet that meat creates.

When you care for your house plants, reenergize them with any of these: cooled cooking water from preparing vegetables, potatoes, pasta, or green tea (leaves or brewed). No wasted water and happy plants—a good combination.

When you shampoo your hair, kick the plastic habit. Choose a shampoo bar instead. Try various options for no plastic-use for multiple personal and home care products.

When you love <u>butterflies</u>, give those pollinators (and <u>others</u>) a reason to stop at your place—plants, especially ones that are native to your area, that feed caterpillars and the beautiful, winged creatures that give us great delight. Nix the pesticides for their sake too.

When you shop online for anything, check the "About" portion of the website before you buy. Find out what the company is or is not doing to care for creation and justice. Support those sources that help not harm. Look for <u>B Corp</u> and other companies that give back <u>1% for the planet</u>.

When you pray or <u>plan or lead worship</u>, include creation justice in the prayers, hymn choices, and other liturgy. In your personal prayers, pray for God's creation and for justice.


When you talk to friends or family about climate-related issues, <u>focus on solutions</u> more than problems. Share what you are already doing and encourage your family and friends to do at least one more thing themselves for the planet and for justice.

When you are choosing products and you wonder which ones are truly good for the earth, you don't need to be confused or worried about "greenwashing." Here's a quick read that can help clarify the labels "green," "non-toxic," "cruelty-free," "organic," "natural," "Green Seal Certified," and "Ecologo."

When you head to the beach, lake, or river for recreation, note that the word is also "re: creation." Look at the beauty God has provided and offer a prayer of gratitude. Look also for signs of humanity being care-less with nature. Take gloves and trash bags (preferably reusable) along with your supplies and stash the trash. Try quantifying your haul by weight or number of bags for example). Tell others what you have done and discovered.

The United Methodist Creation Justice Movement is providing these Tips as a tool to equip church members, families, and individuals to respond to God's call to care for creation and do justice with our neighbors. For more about the UM Creation Justice Movement, go to umcreationjustice.org.
